Policy Hearing Recap: OSHA Protections for Public Employees

Currently, Pennsylvania workers at state and local government agencies do not have Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) protection. This means that workers of state and local governments are powerless to change their work environment if they feel unsafe at any time.

Last Thursday, the Pennsylvania Democratic Policy Committee held a virtual public hearing to discuss Senate Bill 310 (Protecting Workplace Safety) and hear from leaders in government, labor, and education on how to best expand OSHA protections for both public and nonprofit employees.

Workers deserve to know that when they come to work, their health and safety is a priority and not an afterthought. No one should have to accept that life threatening conditions are just part of a job, and workers in every profession and field should have OSHA protections. I am proud to support Senate Bill 310, and I am so grateful to Senator Tartaglione for championing this bill in the Senate and making workplace protections a priority in our caucus. 


Fair Funding for PA Schools

When it comes to <u>public school underfunding</u> in PA, the facts are clear: 86% of the students in PA public schools attend school districts that are not adequately funded according to state law. For years, the Majority party in the General Assembly has failed to live up to their responsibility to provide sufficient state funding for public schools, which has left communities across the state without the resources they need for quality education.

Last week, PA hit a milestone in the fight against COVID-19 when the DOH announced that 50% of the population over 18 is fully vaccinated. All Pennsylvanians 16 or older are eligible to get vaccinated, and eligibility for the Pfizer vaccine expanded to children ages 12 to 15 on May 10. Pennsylvania Treasurer Stacy Garrity has <u>announced</u> that Treasury has started processing payments for the annual Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program. Eligible Pennsylvanians can still apply through June 30, 2021, to receive a rebate this year.
